- · Beverage of choice


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MY FAVORITE CHRISTMAS GIFTS AND TRADITIONS

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
MY FAVORITE CHRISTMAS GIFTS AND TRADITIONS


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MY FAVORITE CHRISTMAS GIFTS AND TRADITIONS

The way to teach your children to give intentional acts of kindness is to model it for them. On Christmas Eve we celebrate with our extended family but before it gets too late, we head to the local diner and order one cup of hot cocoa each. We aren't hungry, but it's our excuse to fill the table with wads of \$1 tips. Even the littlest members empty their pockets to bless the little waitress working on Christmas Eve.

What do you do when your child throws a fit over a gift? Your best defense is offense. Keep your focus on family, with gifts being the bonus. Teach your children to be gracious receivers, practicing saying thank you and what to do if they get a dud. They'll think it's funny, and in the event it happens, they'll have tools to manage their disappointment. We use to incorporate the White Elephant game into our extended family celebration. If you are not familiar with it, everyone brings bad gifts for fun. Worst gift of the evening is actually the best. If a melt down does occur, don't be afraid to give a time-out... (yes, even at Christmas.) Most fits, are not over gifts, however, they are the result of tired, sugar-filled children. You might have to leave events early and monitor the dessert table. Finally, remind children of their sharing rules, preempt if possible, redirect focus, and correct when necessary.

This is one of our famiy's all-time favorites! Every few years we give 12 differnt family dates or events to be enjoyed throughout the year. Your dates can be anything from a family trip to McDonalds to a play date in the park to an elaborate vacation. It's not what you do that matters as much as the fun way you do it and how you present it. You can give your gifts in 12 seperate boxes filled with themed accessories for each event. You can use treasure maps or clues to discover what excitement lies in store. You can even save the boxes and not open them until the 25th of each month! (Of course you'll want other gifts under the tree, because this version is sheer torture... but the kids love it, and it's a special way to extend the spirit of Christmas throughout the year.

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

I grew up in a home of modest means where we only received a handful of gifts for Christmas and that included underwear. The gifts we did receive were beyond cherished. I can even tell you what most of them were. To help my children understand the purpose of giving gifts, I use a golden box. In it I place a gift certificate or letter announcing either one special family gift or one special gift for each of them. It could be as simple as a date with mom, or as elaborate as a trip, or a special activity. All the other gifts are fun and given in love, but The Golden Box holds the gifts I hope they'll remember for the rest of their lives.

I take advantage of opportunities to teach my children to savor special moments. In an instant world, it's okay to slow down Christmas. To do this we play a game called the Christmas Clock. It varies from year to year, but the idea stays the same. Instead of opening all the gifts in one mad rush, we set the timer and open them throughout the morning. This sounds like Christmas torture but we accidentally fell on this when our toddlers did not want to open more gifts until they had a chance to play with the one they had. We just adapted to them and realized how much we loved slowing down Christmas to include reading the Christmas story, breakfast, prayer, and playing with each new gift before moving on to the next. This tradition grew with us but if you have small children, you might find this works well for your family.
